My names Ashley Cummins and I'm going to be your Mission Guide.

All my life I've known foreign lands and people.

Daughter of two missionaries I soon found a passion for the same field of work. Upon our return to the States my Dad became involved in Apartment Ministry working with the Immigrant population. From as young as 9 I've been following in my parent's footsteps. As a high school student I felt a calling to work with refugee children. I've worked in 3 Apartment Complexes in the Atlanta area for the past two years and now found myself in Clarkson working at Kensington Station Apartment.

A **mission** is an Apartment given to Whirlwind Missions located in a multi-housing community. A mission has regular work such as an After School Program, Computer Classes, Reading Clubs, English as a Second Language, Bible Studies and other Community Events!



The first Mission was created 10 years ago by Tim Cummins. It is located in Azalea Apartments in Chamblee, Doraville, the International Village of Atlanta. Within about a 4 square miles of Interstate 285 there are 145 different countries represented and over 761 language groups! Without a doubt the whole world has come to us!


For the apartment managers a mission is another selling point in the competitive market. The managers now have an advantage in the ability to offer free educational and recreational activities for all the residents. At no cost to the manager this is a win-win situation.

For the kids of the complex the mission is a safe place where all their friends are playing sports, working on their homework, surfing on the computers, eating snacks or just hanging out with each other.

And for you! A mission is where you can plug in for 2 hours, or more, a week to help kids in school and life. It's somewhere fun that you look forward going to and it's a place where you can build relationships and save souls!

Many of the Refugee and International children that we work with are having a hard time in school. Because of their low literacy skills many children fall behind. Most of the parents can't speak English let alone read English. So they can offer no assistance.

Think about the last time you willing did something you were horrible at. Never! Same with the kids.

They become frustrated and feel helpless so they quit, drop out and sometimes join gangs and start using drugs. This is where you come in! Just by coming and helping the children with their home work can make a world of difference to their lives! Whirlwind

Mission Volunteers come and assist the kids with their homework while at the same time building a 1-on-1 relationship.

Kid's Religions

A majority of the kids are either Muslim, Buddhist, or Catholic so volunteers have to share Jesus in a loving way such as Helping with homework, Listening to Kids, Teaching Kids, Playing and Spending time with The kids.

Kids Who Come

Most of the Apartments have an average of 20-25 kids who will participate. Ranging from 1st- 7th grade. With a mix of some High Schoolers and Preschoolers. A good missionary group size would be 6-8 kids and 2 adults. The best ratio is about 1 missionary (YOU!) and 3 residents.

TYPICAL DAY

All You Need to Know about the Ghetto: TYPICAL DAY at Ashley's Mission

I pull up at the Mission with time to spare before the kid's school bus gets here. (Around 3:00) I run down to the Mission and make sure all the tables are set up. Depending on space set up can be different.

I hear the bus coming from up the street so I walk back up to the stop. Some of the parents are waiting. Here's a great time to start getting to know the families and tell them about the Program. Since my Mission is primarily African American just about everybody speaks English. At other Missions that may not be the case, ask what people group live in that area and try to learn some simple commands in their language for moments like these.

The Kids all run up to me screaming excitedly! They're a rowdy bunch but it's a loving feeling.

We all head inside to start on Homework. I usually walk around the tables and check on each kid or if we have enough volunteers for each table I like to pick a certain table to stay at and help just those 4 or 5 kids. For the younger children in Kindergarten and 1st grade the homework is simple coloring or cutting out shapes and for the older kids it might be helping them read to find answers or reviewing over spelling words.

From the beginning of school the kids always seem to have projects so it's nice to buy a few of the basics.(Under \$30)

After studying and school work we go outside and play!

I like to do lots of Relay Races, Basket Ball and Soccer on the
Tennis Courts. They also enjoy Hide and Seek, Tag..

Check out Game Time Pg When the kids are all tired out we sit down and I say

"Stay and Listen to the Bible Story so you can get some cookies!" Sometimes we act it out and uses props (tables, books, paper towels as beards...) This way the kids get really into it.

After we've done our homework, played outside, heard a Bible story and made something to show mom, and packed up there's nothing better to do than EAT!

Snack Time should be saved for last. This way you have leverage in keeping the kids attention during the Bible Story. Kids should already be packed up and waiting outside.

Have a prayer and Serve.

I keep cookies and stir -up drink mix in a cooler and store it in the fridge at the Mission. If you don't have a kitchen set-up make at least 2 jugs full at home and bring them. Store Brand Cookies are delicious and cheap! The kids mainly prefer Chocolate Chip, Chocolate Sandwich Cookies and Vanilla.

For the Juice- Mix just add water. Fruit Flavors, Cherry are always good. At Snack Time I hand 2 cookies and a drink to each child as they leave the Mission.

This can be a good job for younger Volunteers.

It's better to eat outside. That way there's less mess to clean up. Make sure if you have Juice Box wrappers or any Snack trash you pick it up. It's a good idea to take a big trash-can outside during the snack.

When a kid throws something away make a big deal about how good they are! This encourages more kids.

Around 5:30 is Departure Time. Say your good-byes and seeyou-tomorrows here.

Clean up is all that's left. This is easy just scrub down the tables and sweep. If you want to give some of the kids a leadership position clean up is a good task for them to complete. Stack chairs and tables if necessary, if not just push in the chairs. Turn off the lights and computers, close any blinds and lock up the Mission.

When you leave make sure the room looks tidy enough that if the manager were to come in they'd be proud.

SAFETY & HEALTH Guidelines



SAFETY

Don't freak out! If you go running and screaming so will the kids!

- •Make sure you register all the kids. This way you have each child's Contact and Health Information.
- •Keeping an Attendance Sheet can help in making sure everyone is accounted for in case of an emergency.
 - •Know how to evacuate everyone to a safe place in the

All of the missions are safe in the Day time. However if everything were perfect we wouldn't be working there!
So Volunteers stay alert for Suspicious Activities and Individuals such as

- 1. Selling of Drugs
- 2. Buying of Drugs
- 3. Carrying a Weapon
- 4. Trying to sell of give away harmful materials.

Report to the Manager if you witness any of the above listed!

In dealing with naughty children first say sternly "Do you want me to tell your Mama about this? Let's go talk to her right now!" Then act like your headed out to talk to the parent. If this doesn't work the child should be sent home.

MEALTH

Illness and Injury

Illness

Children with these conditions are not to be allowed in the mission.

- •Child with fever over 101 degrees
- Sever Cough
- Communicable Disease

If you have a Child that's sick, have his/her friends pray for them to get better.

Becomes Sick at Mission

- Call parent/guardian Immediately
- •Check to see if they are able to walk home with Volunteers, Friends or Family
- Check Medical History
- Place in suitable area away from others
- •Call Children's Health Care of Atlanta 404-250-5437 (Press 1 for nurse advice)

Injury

- If the injuries not bad check and if a cookie helps ask. "Do you want a cookie? What kind of cookie? Can you help me pass them out?" All these questions at once make the child stop thinking about the pain.
- For Minor cuts and bruises apply practical First Aid

Inside the Mission

Here's a good list of the basic Supplies and Ideas you can use in order to be fully prepared. You don't have to go out and buy everything, just the ones marked with stars (most commonly used). You can also print out all the Forms ad Flyers to be used at your own Mission. When you're first starting out print out at least 25 copies of the Registration, Health and Code of Conduct Forms. These should be stapled together as a packet.

- Look for old stationary and school supplies at home
- Try to get Sunday School Classes to help collect certain items.
- You can also contact retired teachers who may have tons of materials and resources.
- Also when making purchases at the store tell the Store Manager what's happening. Sometimes they give you big savings!

Developing a Lesson Plan

Think of the kids that you're working with. What are some of the problems they are facing? What are some issues you need to deal with? Think of some ways you can address those problems in the lesson you'll teach.

Ex: The kids are constantly fighting and have anger problems. You could teach Ephesians 4:26-27. Talking about how God doesn't say it's sinful to be angry but he is concerned in how we handle our anger. Then make the kids Think of things that make them really angry.

Next step in developing a Lesson is **finding a game** or experience to teach the lesson. By that I mean give the kids something to do so they understand what they're learning about.

Ex: You're teaching about anger. You might have all the kids roar or stomp their feet, make angry faces.

The Super Bible Game Book By Linda Standke is great for teaching lessons. It features Ten Talents Game, Bible Word Cube, Walk the Plank, Memory Verse Balloon Toss... You get the idea.

The Encyclopedia of Games created By Mary Hoenstein is good too. It has indoor and outdoor games.

After you have the Topic, Bible Verse and Game next is **finding** a **craft**. This can be a simple worksheet that you can print out and color or a paper plate to cut and make a hat.
